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Depression. Depression is a low mood that lasts for a significant amount of time. The severity of depression can vary; a mild depression might not stop you from doing your normal activities, although it can make them harder to do and things might not feel worthwhile; when depression is more severe it can leave you feeling suicidal and unable to function normally.
